To:-

3rd Canadian Infantry Brigade.

Sir:-

I beg to state that as Colonel Bent's Runner, I was with him constantly from the night of August 14th to the morning of August 17th, when the Battalion came out of the line, after the attack on Hill 70.

Directly after hearing that the Battalion had reached its objective I went with the Colonel to the new Battalion Advanced Headquarters, well within the old German lines. There the Colonel found that he could not maintain connection with Brigade, and after making himself acquainted with the situation and sending his Adjutant, Mr. Haldane, into the line to replace casualties, we started back to the old Headquarters. We had hardly started when we were caught in the barrage that came with the first counter attack. In order to get back we had to cross the old No Man's Land without any cover, right through the heavy barrage. Barely had the Colonel reached his Headquarters, when the explosion of a bomb, killing the Sentry on the Dugout, warned him that Germans were coming up in the rear, less than 50 yards away. The Colonel, who was without any other Officers, immediately organized his Headquarters staff of signallers, clerks, Runners and Batmen, and started them out to repulse the Germans, only returning to telephone the situation to Brigade. The party made up of his staff successfully bombed the invaders back from within 25 yards of the dugout.

The next day the Colonel again went up to Advanced Headquarters through heavy shell fire, the journey necessitating the crossing of the old No Man's Land, again without cover and under machine gun fire.

During my trips with the Colonel he exposed himself to great danger repeatedly

ordered to make a reconnaissance
it was necessary to make a ^{daylight} reconnaissance
of the enemy wire ^{in front of FRESHNOY}. Pl. Butterfield volunteered
for this undertaking. He as the enemy
line was ~~not~~ not visible from our
line it was necessary for him to
cross no man's land in full view of the
enemy. This he did and the enemy
~~found~~ then they came on him
he kept on however and with the greatest
of coolness ran from shell hole to
shell hole until he was in position
to get the necessary observation. He
obtained very accurate information
as to the wire and returned safely
with heavy fire to the Battalion.
This man has ~~so~~ always been
ready to undertake any dangerous task
and his gallantry and bravery are
worthy of the highest commendation.

On the 28 April 1917 May Sheppard
Company was holding the front line to
the east of ARLEIX and facing FRESHNOY.
This position had just been taken and
was subjected to the very heaviest
shell fire by the enemy batteries. May
Sheppard inspired his men with the greatest
courage personally moved up and down
his line at the greatest personal risk
and personally directed the dispositions
of his men. One of his officers was
killed and many of the men were
casualties but he continued with the
greatest coolness and fearlessness to
direct his ~~own~~ company.
This officer ~~came~~ joined the
Battalion in May 1915 and has
been in France continuously since
that time. He has always shown himself to be a
gallant and undaunted soldier.
His gallantry on this occasion
was an example to all ranks

He also conducted a very useful reconnaissance patrol to ascertain the fate of another Post which had been demolished by hostile shell fire.

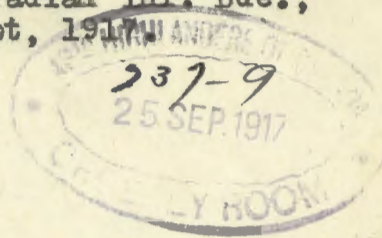


